

## Guide to managing your child's medication at school

Sending your child — and their medication — to school doesn't have to be overwhelming. With a little bit of preparation and communication, you can provide the right support to ensure they stay on track with their medication throughout the school year.

Use this "cheat sheet" to ensure you have all the information you need close at hand.

Each medication you send to school should include detailed instructions for the school staff.
